Jaycee School, Ankola started a plant nursery at school with the help of the Forest Department. They also started the beach monitoring program at Bilekere beach.

SDM School, Ujire members conducted an awareness rally on cleanliness along with a Slogan writing competition. They learnt

to prepare natural dyes and continued the Bat Census and Phenology monitoring which is done on a monthly basis.

Students of Shree Someshwara School, Tumkur prepared Herbar-



ium, raised plant nursery, constructed a compost pit and looked at the species diversity in the school Campus. In addition to this they visited a Pond to study Pond ecosystem and agricultural farms nearby.

While Jaycees School, Sringeri students visited Sri JCBM College to study specimens of invertebrates, members of Vyasarajapura Govt. High School, T. Narasipura visited Kaggalipura lake to watch birds. They are also busy taking care of saplings while using the compost prepared at school. 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Coordinator's Column: Anti-plastic campaign, Ankola







During many of the DNA club sessions the problem of plastic carry bags was discussed and as people concerned about the environment we decided to do something about it.

Ankola is a small town in coastal Karnataka. It has a compact market area where the consumption of plastic is the greatest. We decided to concentrate on this area and worked out a survey schedule to get an idea of per day consumption of plastic carry bags. Having done that, we went in pairs to interview the shop owners about their views on plastic, numbers used and alternatives. When this was consolidated, it was found that per day plastic carry bag consumption in the town municipality area itself was one lakh!

The next step was to create awareness about the dangerous effects of plastics on the environment and we did this with posters, banners, speeches, slogans, proces-

sions and street plays. The media, especially the local news channel played its role to spread the awareness.

The town municipality corporation chief officer wholeheartedly supported us and had arranged for the local self help group



women to get trained in making paper and cloth bags. Volunteers collected old newspapers and with home made paste the women were taught to make paper bags of different kinds and sizes. Several sessions of stitching cloth bags were also conducted with the women who knew basic tailoring. They were provided with details of whole sale shops for buying material. Cost analysis showed

that they could have a very good profit margin on the bags even if they were sold locally. The women were keen to take on the project and with a little help from the town municipality and/or local NGOs it would have taken off beautifully. Unfortunately the Chief Officer was transferred and the project was deferred. Despite this disappointment, however, the children are doing all they can to reduce plastic use, including speaking out against plastic use and using cloth bags themselves. The students are continuing with their awareness campaign in different schools and places. The Deputy Commissioner himself visited our school to see the activities of the students in the field of environment. He invited the students to perform the anti plastic skit for the Independence Day celebration in the District Head-

quarters, Karwar, which they did.

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
